


## At this time of year, a wildfire is the most likely community emergency to affect Jasper

## Be Prepared

- Keep a full tank of gas in your personal vehicle
- Have important papers and an emergency kit ready to go

While first responders will be busy handling the threat, you need to be prepared to look after yourself and your family for a minimum of 72 hours. Your ability to be self-sufficient will free up resources to assist those in need. Simple preparedness can make a big difference when a disaster strikes. Get a copy of the Jasper Emergency Guide or check our website for a complete emergency kit list. Guides are available at the administration office, Fitness & Aquatic Centre, Activity Centre, Jasper Library and at the Jasper Park Chamber of Commerce office.



### Evacuations

Evacuation routes, timing and affected area can vary greatly depending on the nature of the emergency. This information will be communicated clearly and broadly in the event of an evacuation.

#### **Evacuation Alert**

Whenever possible, the Municipality will issue an Evacuation Alert, notifying the public to prepare for an evacuation within a specified time frame.

#### **Evacuation Order**

In circumstances where there is little or no time to notify, the Municipality may issue an Evacuation Order immediately.

# **Evacuation Alerts**and Orders

The Municipality of Jasper is responsible for evacuating the community in case of an emergency.

Public safety is always the number one priority; emergency personnel from the Municipality of Jasper (Fire Department and Bylaw), the RCMP and Parks Canada (Resource Conservation Officers) will work together to enforce an Evacuation Order.

A typical evacuation alert or order will include the following information:

- Description of the affected area and reason for evacuation;
- For an evacuation alert, the anticipated evacuation timeframe:
- For an evacuation order, direction that you must leave immediately;
- The travel route to take to evacuate; and
- The location of the Reception Centre.

Reception Centres provide short-term services to individuals and families who cannot stay with friends or family following an evacuation, or need to access other evacuee services.

Once evacuated, you will also be asked to register with the Municipality of Jasper so you and your family can be accounted for, and to receive updates and information. Registering will also make you easier to find for family and friends who may be looking for you.

### **Evacuation Checklist**

	In advance of an evacuation, plan a common place
	to meet family or co-workers
	Keep vehicles fuel tanks at least 3/4 full
	Make sure civic address is clearly posted on your residence or business
	Make plans for emergency travel with neighbours or local friends if you do not have a vehicle or access to one
	Listen to local news, jasper-alberta.com or Community & Family Services Jasper on Facebook
Pa	cking up
	Wear and pack season appropriate clothing
	Take purse, cash and credit cards – bank machines may not be working
	Take medications, eye glasses, documents, photos and ID
	Take blankets, sleeping bags, books, games, pillows
	Make arrangements for pets and take leashes,
_	crates, pet food – don't leave pets behind
Pr	eparing Your Home
	Be sure all windows and doors are shut
	Close metal window blinds if present
	Remove light window coverings and other combustibles from windows
	Gather lawn furniture and toys in a remote area of your yard, away from structures and vegetation
	Hook up garden sprinklers but don't turn them on
	Shut off gas and electrical appliances EXCEPT refrigerators and freezers
	Move propane tanks away from your house

	Leave exterior lights on to show power is on
